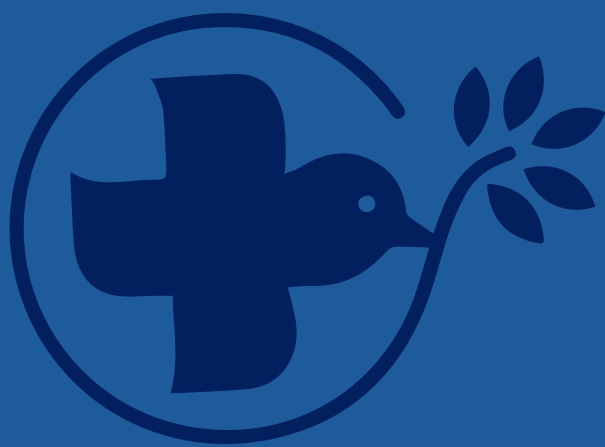

Our organisation collaborates with partners and key stakeholders to implement projects that facilitate access to primary and secondary healthcare services and mental health and psychosocial support (MHPSS) services to respond to the medical needs of displaced population.

DDD/MdM Türkiye is the **16th member of Médecins du Monde International Network** that is committed to meeting the health needs of vulnerable people globally.

Responding to the humanitarian crises emerged in the region from within the crisis DDD/MdM Türkiye seeks out marginalized populations and builds necessary infrastructures for long-term and sustainable healthcare services in areas society would prefer to ignore.

Since 2015, DDD/MdM Türkiye implements programmes in both Türkiye and Syria offering free access to healthcare services to refugee and internally displaced populations.



DDD/MdM Türkiye works with a range of humanitarian professionals and technical experts to provide primary health care (PHC), mental health and psychosocial support (MHPSS) as well as sexual and reproductive health (SRH) services.

As DDD/MdM Türkiye, **Our Mission** is to provide support to all people who are excluded from the health system, since at least half of the world's population—particularly children, women and refugees—lack access to essential health services and medical care due to global injustice and misuse of resources.

DDD/MdM Türkiye's Mission is to provide lifesaving and life-sustaining medical care to those most in need by assisting populations in distress, victims of natural: man-made disasters or armed conflicts.

WHAT WE DO

DDD/MdM Türkiye
INTERVENTION

DDD/MdM in Türkiye focuses on implementing activities that meet refugees and migrants' most pressing needs by providing mental health and psychosocial support as well as primary health care (PHC) through Medical Mobile Units (MMUs) in İstanbul, İzmir and Hatay.

Through its MMUs in the rural areas of Bayraklı and Torbalı districts of İzmir and in Manisa, DDD/MdM Türkiye provides PHC services, medical and SRH consultations, preventive screening sessions and supports referrals to its İzmir MHPSS Centre and PHC facilities.

In its Community Centre in Fatih (İstanbul) throughout 2020, DDD/MdM Türkiye aimed at promoting the integration of Sub-Saharan African refugees, migrants and asylum seekers into the host population and the public health services. In accordance with this purpose, DDD/MdM Türkiye provided awareness and health promotion group sessions, case management and orientation services as well as language classes and legal counselling.

Within the context of its Syria Programme, DDD/MdM Türkiye ensures the provision of PHC, SRH and MHPSS services both to the displaced and host populations in Aleppo and Idlib governorates of Syria through direct implementation and implementing partners.

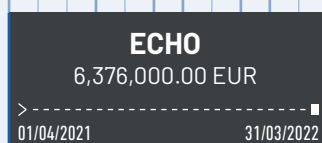
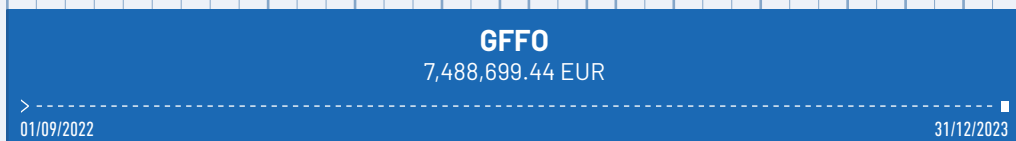
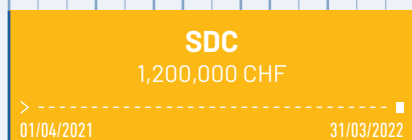
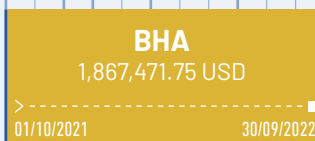
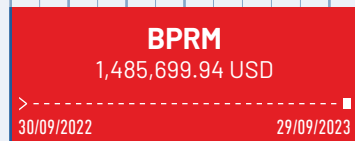
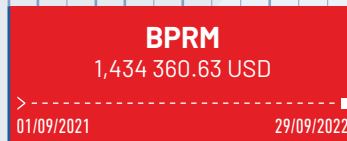
In 2018, DDD/MdM Türkiye began operations in Turkish-controlled areas of northwest Syria (NWS). At the beginning of 2019, MDM-France handed over its North-West-Syria programming to DDD/MdM Türkiye.

DDD/MdM Türkiye and partners are now providing primary health care, sexual and reproductive health and MHPSS services across 13 Health facilities, and one BEmONC center, directly reaching more than half-a-million individuals in NWS Syria.

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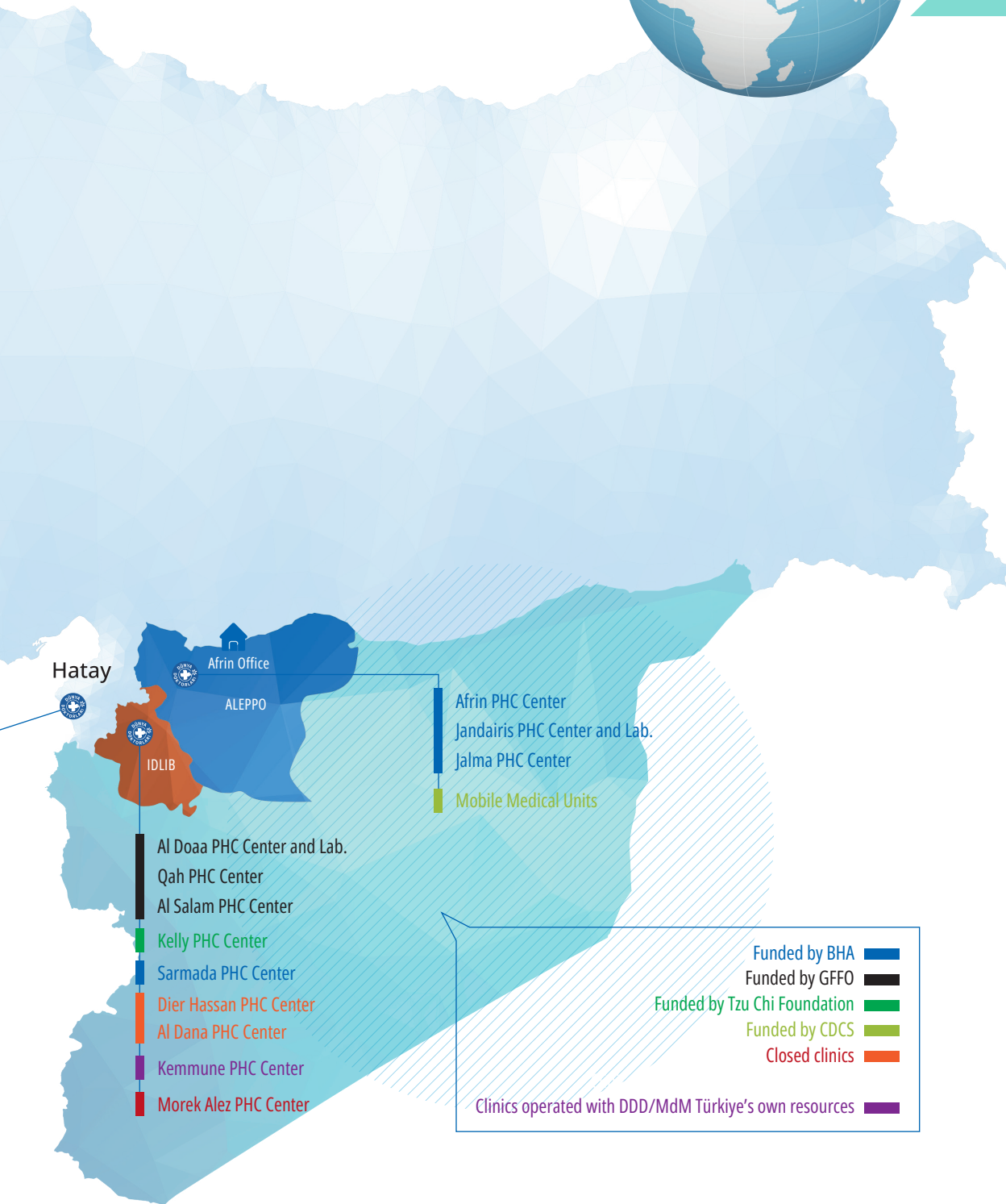

PROGRAMMES

GENERAL NOTES ABOUT THE PROJECTS

The project descriptions in the following pages aim to provide a summary of each specific project. In addition to the services mentioned in these descriptions, all the projects include a number of additional activities as part of their implementation:

- DDD/MdM Türkiye regularly coordinates the implementation of projects with relevant governmental and non-governmental actors to ensure the greatest possible access to basic rights and health care for the target population. Comprehensive coordination efforts contribute to informed and effective action by all actors, sharing best practices and available services. This allows DDD/MdM Türkiye to monitor the humanitarian situation and potential emergencies, to better analyze needs in specific areas of intervention, to avoid duplication of services and finally, to maintain a map of services for effective referral of targeted beneficiaries. DDD/MdM Türkiye ensures that all cooperation efforts take place within a legal framework and that it obtains all the necessary official authorizations and carries out protocols for the provision of services.
- DDD/MdM Türkiye closely monitors the implementation of projects and constantly evaluates the quality of the services it provides by regularly assessing the needs of the target population. To this end, the DDD/MdM Türkiye has various channels through which beneficiaries can provide feedback/complaints, both at the project sites and online. Beneficiaries are also informed and consulted through awareness-raising sessions, committee meetings, visibility material, etc. Every new project is designed taking into account the findings of these evaluation and assessment tools. Regular needs assessments, including environmental assessments, and situation reports are produced to assess and respond more appropriately to emerging needs and to avoid potential risks.
- Through pre-defined vulnerability assessment criteria, DDD/MdM Türkiye teams identify the most vulnerable individuals in the target populations and deliver a tailored service as part of its outreach activities such as household visits, or the distribution of in-kind items to address specific needs.
- Capacity building activities are one of the cornerstones of the DDD/MdM Türkiye objective, and are aimed at both local stakeholders, DDD/MdM Türkiye staff and beneficiaries. They cover medical, protection and gender related topics. By focusing on capacity building, DDD/



MdM Türkiye aims to increase the resilience of the host community and foster the mobilization of local stakeholders for a sustainable and sensitive humanitarian response in service delivery. It also aims to strengthen the capacity and well-being of staff to improve their ability to deliver and manage high-quality and inclusive services. It further aims to increase capacity and resilience by empowering beneficiaries through awareness raising sessions. Capacity building activities also include training on key cross-cutting issues such as gender mainstreaming and protection.

- The projects aim to rehabilitate facilities by creating safe spaces and enhance the mobility of DDD/MdM Türkiye teams to improve service delivery while adapting to changing conditions and better recognizing the different needs in different areas to decrease vulnerabilities. To this end, it is able to respond quickly to changing needs, particularly in the event of infectious disease outbreaks or displacement of informal settlements. Rehabilitation work also takes into account the needs of different groups, including people with disabilities and pregnant women.
- DDD/MdM Türkiye intervention adopts a “no harm” and “conflict sensitive” approach. All field interventions are supported by technical SOPs, reviewed by national and international experts in the field. This ensures that, when implementing activities, the needs of vulnerable populations are met in accordance with international and national guidelines. Within the framework of the “do no harm” and “conflict-sensitive” principle, DDD/MdM Türkiye’s intervention does not contribute to the unsustainable management of natural resources. As such, DDD/MdM Türkiye personnel are accepted by the local communities and have a good understanding of the operational context, and finally opt for a community led approach where community leaders are empowered and supported. DDD/MdM Türkiye aims to remain impartial in all processes and provides its services equally to all communities. In order to minimize any conflict-related risks, security teams closely follow up the situation and inform the programme implementation accordingly.

TÜRKİYE PROGRAMME

CONTEXT

Türkiye is currently hosting the largest refugee population in the world with around 3.6 million registered Syrians under temporary protection, around 330.000 international protection status holders and asylum-seekers, along with around 30 thousand international protection applicants are present in the country, of whom 30% is constituted of Ukrainians.

According to the figures from the Turkish Presidency of Migration Management (PMM) available for 2022, there were also an estimated 300.000 irregular or undocumented migrants in Türkiye, primarily from Afghanistan, Syria, Iran, and Iraq, as well as African countries. The actual numbers of migrants for Izmir and Istanbul are estimated to be significantly higher. The majority of migrants and refugees live amongst host communities in urban and rural areas of Türkiye, with Istanbul, Izmir, and Hatay, being some of the provinces with the highest number of Syrian refugees and migrants in the country.

Istanbul is home to the largest migrant populations in Türkiye due to the presence of established migrant networks facilitating the integration of new arrivals as well as NGOs. It is one of the routes frequently used by migrants, and therefore an important center for human trafficking. Work opportunities continue to be the main reason attracting refugees and asylum seekers to Istanbul with 540,618 Syrians alone officially registered with authorities in the province as of April 2022. Izmir province on the south-central coast of Türkiye is only 50 miles from the Greek islands of Lesbos and Chios and is both a last destination and a point of onward migration to Europe. Izmir has been one of the top 10 destinations for refugees and asylum seekers in Türkiye since 2015, with 149,804 Syrians officially registered under Temporary Protection as of April 2022.

Increasing inequality and poverty following an ongoing economic crisis, marked by unprecedented inflation and unemployment rates, exacerbated by the COVID-19 breakdown is pushing Turkish and non-Turkish populations to the margins. Rates of people living below the poverty threshold have increased significantly by 2021. Moreover, on the threshold of the presidential elections, refugee and migrant populations have become a top political issue in Türkiye.

Based on Dünya Doktorları Derneği (DDD) / Médecins du Monde (MdM) Türkiye's experience, it is becoming increasingly difficult for document, irregularly documented and undocumented Syrian and non-Syrian migrants to legalize their status in cities such as Izmir and Istanbul. Many live-in poverty and most find employment in the informal work sectors such as construction or textile. Others work as agricultural laborers (seasonal workers) in rural areas of Türkiye. Moreover, the increase of administrative restrictions hindered by political factors such as the closure of some neighborhoods for legal registration has made access to basic needs and services even more difficult than before.

Without legal documentation, they are excluded from basic primary services providers such as health, and education, and are at risk of deportation. Conflicts and subsequent displacements combined with poor living conditions in Türkiye have had serious consequences on refugees' psychological well-being, with a particularly adverse impact on women, the elderly, and children. Migrants and refugees living in rural areas tend to face additional barriers and have little to no access to healthcare services due to distance, financial constraints, and lack of information on available services.

Within this scope, DDD/MdM Türkiye has carried out operations to increase, improve and facilitate the access of vulnerable groups including refugees, migrants, and asylum seekers- to protection integrated health-care services through primary health care (PHC), Psychological and Social Support, protection awareness raising sessions on rights and services, and case management support. The overall objective of the organization is to enhance the protection and resilience of the most vulnerable populations in Türkiye.

Through its Medical Mobile Units in the rural areas of Bayraklı and Torbalı districts of Izmir and in Manisa, DDD/MdM Türkiye provides for undocumented population and seasonal workers living in camp settlements, PHC services, medical and SRH consultations, preventive screening sessions. DDD/MdM Türkiye performs external referrals in case of need for secondary care services such as public and private hospitals with which the DDD/MdM Türkiye has protocols. In urban Izmir, DDD/MdM Türkiye also conducts household visits. In Istanbul, DDD/MdM Türkiye has extended its cooperation with different local governmental and non-governmental stakeholders to provide PHC, PSS, Health promotion and Awareness Raising sessions, and case management support through its Mobile Units in Zeytinburnu, Esenyurt, and Fatih districts.

In addition, in 2022 Türkiye has become a destination for around 60 thousand Ukrainians fleeing the conflict in Ukraine as they were seeking international protection or were present with a tourist visa. Under its project, DDD/MdM Türkiye has been providing food vouchers and transportation cards to help them secure their basic needs. Awareness-raising sessions on rights and services available to them, as well as case management support including accompaniment to the hospitals and covering their health costs, has been provided in order to increase the health and safety of Ukrainian refugees in Istanbul.

With the support of Bureau of Population, Refugee and Migration, Dünya Doktorları (DDD) reached a total of 16,656 vulnerable migrant in Izmir (Urban Konak and Torbalı, and rural Torbalı), Manisa (rural Saruhanlı and Turgutlu) and urban Istanbul (Esenyurt, Zeytinburnu, and Fatih) including Syrians, Somalis, Senegalese, Sudanese, and Yemeni among others between September 2021 – September 2022.

The project provided protection and health services to fill critical gaps and address the needs of vulnerable people and increase the resilience of both migrant and refugee communities and local stakeholders in the above-mentioned urban and rural areas. DDD/MdM Türkiye has implemented it through the mobile teams allowing for adaptability and flexibility to the specific needs of different project locations.

Syrian and non-Syrian beneficiaries received various services thorough the project duration: On the one hand, protection awareness raising sessions on rights and services increased the sense of safety of individuals included key information on legal and administration processes in Türkiye. On the other hand, DDD/MdM Türkiye provided health promotion to individuals to raise beneficiaries' awareness about major health issues and available services including COVID-19, hygiene, healthy diet, communicable and chronic diseases, and family planning. In coordination with the Izmir Public Health Directorate (PHD), DDD/MdM Türkiye also led vaccination campaigns targeting seasonal workers that lead to the vaccination of hundreds of people. This is a significant and long-term impact on the health of these beneficiaries who were at high risk due to the lack of WASH facilities in their camps. Among others, PSS sessions strengthened beneficiaries' psychological resilience, coping skills, stress management and conflict resolution by also including cross cutting issues such as, child protection, and GBV concerns.

A notable achievement during this period was the registration of undocumented infants with the Turkish authorities as a result of DDD/MdM Türkiye interventions. This is a significant and enduring impact on these four children and their families, as these children can now access medical and education services, as well as other support systems. DDD/MdM Türkiye also provided health-oriented case management to people and paid for the health care costs of vulnerable people in need, thus creating a life changing impact on people's life

In the first quarter of the project from 30 September 2022 – 31 December 2022 funded by PRM, DDD/MdM Türkiye continued to successfully implement the project in Izmir (urban Konak and rural Torbali), Manisa (rural Saruhanli and Turgutlu) and urban Istanbul (Esenyurt, Zeytinburnu, and Fatih) locations.

During this period, the project has reached out in total 2,432 vulnerable Syrian and non-Syrian migrant beneficiaries with an aim to strengthen the protective environment for the vulnerable population by providing awareness raising sessions, health related service, PSS wellbeing sessions. As for the second objective, the project continues to improve the access of over vulnerable people to health, social and legal services by providing them remote health consultation and case management support to increase their sense of safety and resilience.

DDD/MdM Türkiye continued to coordinate between the Public Health Directorate and the municipality to provide basic needs to the vulnerable population following the outbreak of diseases such as influenza virus infection, enteritis due to winter conditions in the seasonal worker camps in Izmir and Manisa.

DDD/MdM Türkiye also expanded its coordination mechanisms and partnerships with other stakeholders at the project sites. New protocol partnerships were established with community-based organisations to provide services through mobile units.

Notably, DDD/MdM Türkiye covered the surgery cochlear and surgery costs of the Syrian-Turkmen girl Kader, enabling her to hear for the first time in cooperation with a public hospital. The story was broadcast on several television and digital news channels and received extensive media coverage.

Strengthen the health and safety of vulnerable Ukrainian refugees in Istanbul, Türkiye

Project Summary



The project strengthened the health and safety of vulnerable Ukrainian refugees in Istanbul by the purchase of food vouchers and transportation cards to meet vulnerable Ukrainian's basic needs, while increasing their knowledge of the Turkish legal system and access services such as health care. Within the scope of the project, a protocol with the Ukrainian Solidarity Association has been signed to refer and follow up vulnerable cases.

Through Ukrainian translators funded by William H. Donner Foundation, DDD/MdM Türkiye mobile team provided information sessions on their rights in Türkiye as well on the Turkish health system to navigate them through it. Ukrainians also benefitted from health-oriented protection case provided by DDD, including accompaniment in the health care services, providing translation from Turkish, and covering medical consultation and drug costs.

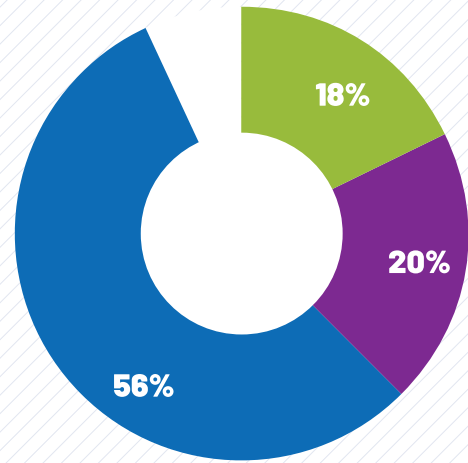
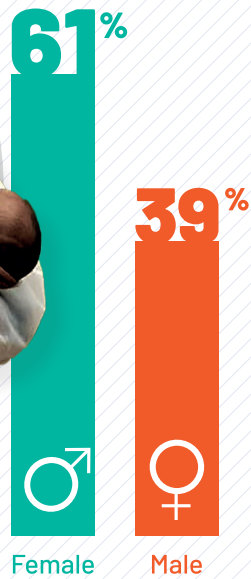
The project aims on the one hand to develop territorial communities capable of understanding the socio-health needs of foreign citizens and on the other hand, to elaborate solution to facilitate their access to prevention, diagnosis, and treatment practices. Specific objectives of the project are to train health workers with relational and intercultural skills, to raise awareness among foreign citizens on the issues of primary, secondary, and tertiary prevention and to sensitise local communities on project issues by increasing intercultural social interaction and inclusion.

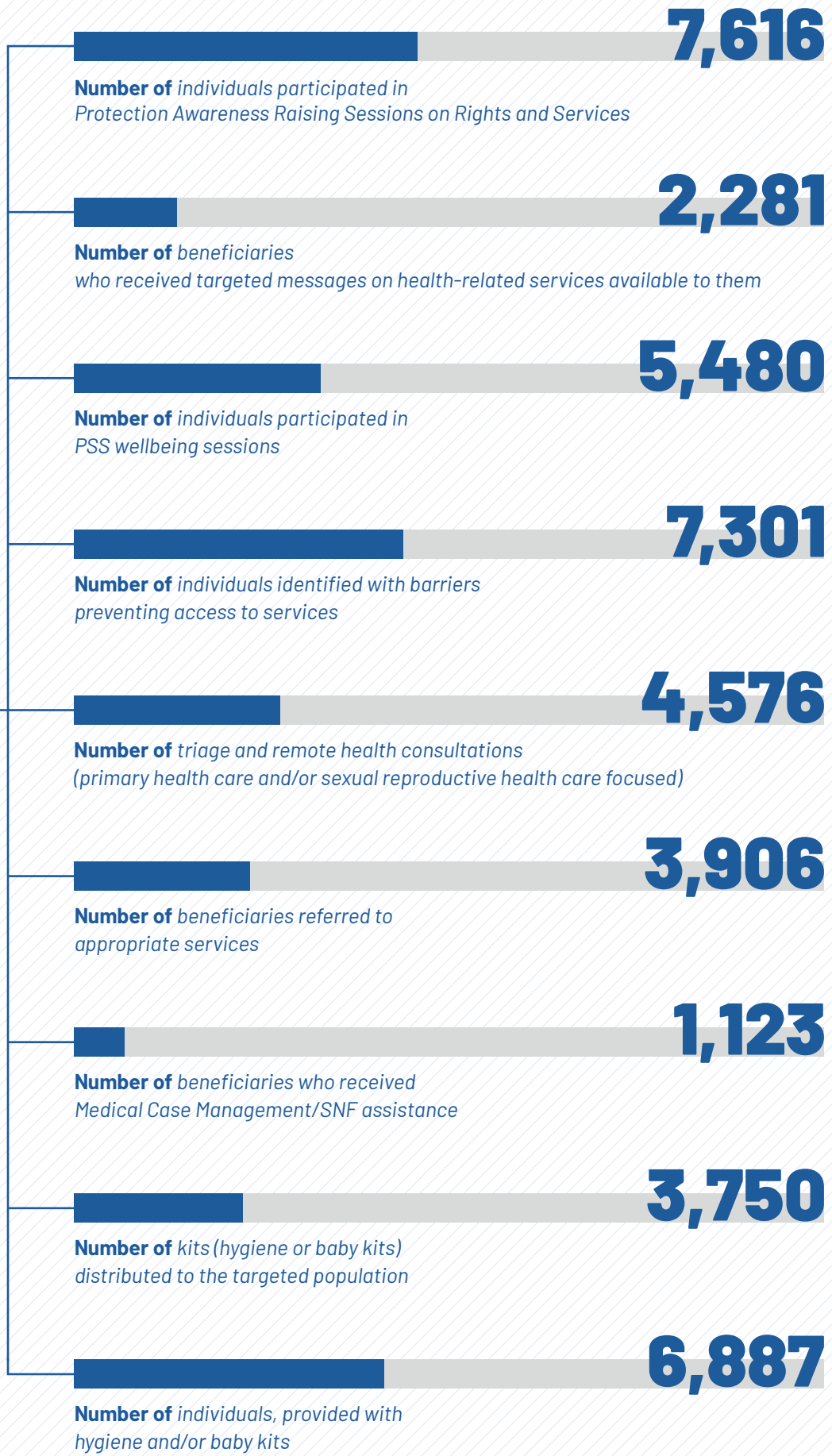

SYRIA PROGRAMME

CONTEXT

The civil war in Syria has claimed thousands of lives, displaced over 10 million people and fueled the worst refugee crisis since World War II.

The socio-economic impact of war, including the depletion of economic resources, the continuation of forced displacement movements, and the destruction of livelihoods, has had a profound effect on local communities to access and use vital/essential services such as health care.

By the end of 2022, 5.6 million people in northwestern Syria were in need for humanitarian support. Epidemics such as measles, acute bloody diarrhea, typhoid fever, and cutaneous leishmaniasis continued to be serious health issues due to certain health risks accompanied by overpopulated refugee camps, poor living and sanitation conditions, and lack of access to necessary vaccination services in unregistered settlements.

Attacks against civilians stuck in the middle of protracted conflict environment also result in disability injuries, trauma, and war-related psychological problems. Around 27% of Syrian population above 12 years of age have a disability, while 50% of them needs mental health and psychosocial services.

The humanitarian situation in northwest Syria worsened after the escalation in violence between 2019 and 2020. According to the United Nations Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (UN OCHA), nearly 1 million people -81% of them women and children - have been displaced in the region since 1st December 2019. Dana, Salqin and Azaz, three sub-districts in Idlib and Aleppo host 56% of recent internally displaced people. Although the severity of internal displacements has decreased following the ceasefire on March 6, 2022, the needs have increase as northwest Syria becomes increasingly isolated and dependent on foreign aid.

In the northern part of the Aleppo Governorate, internally displaced people have had to settle in informal camps, unfinished buildings, and open spaces due to lack of appropriate places for new settlements. Furthermore, the lack of access to clean, palatable water and adequate sani-

tation, bad weather conditions, and the fuel shortage resulting in price hike have led to the deterioration of the living conditions of internally displaced people and the host community.

A cholera outbreak started in Syria in September 2022, particularly in the northern part of the war-torn country, adding a new layer to the suffering of the people of Syria.

The cholera outbreak erupted due to a contaminated water wells in the region was another reminder of how crucial it is to continuously support and sustain critical infrastructure that allows humanitarian corridors for the delivery of essential services.

The ongoing conflicts lasting for almost 12 years have seriously damaged the water and channel networks and decreased supply by 40 percent, while only 52 percent of the hospitals are operational under harsh conditions. The outbreak came amid a repeatedly reported water crisis, scarce funding for urgent humanitarian needs and ongoing armed conflict with threats of further attacks.

The 2022-2023 Humanitarian Response Plan for Syria had only 27% of the necessary resources. Health financing represented barely 16.7% of the aid provided and with a gap of 484 million dollars, while nutrition financing reached 10.7% with a gap of 11 million.

Project provided comprehensive primary health care and protection services, either in collaboration with local partners or through direct implementation, in Idlib governorates of Syria. It addressed the most pressing health needs through integrated health provided in Primary Health Care Centers (PHCCs). The project directly benefits 111,272 people via 3 different PHCC in Idlib Governorate (Al Doaa, Al Salam, and Qah).

The focus was on sexual and reproductive health care, and the approach also included components of mental health and psychosocial support (MHPSS) and gender-based violence (GBV). Each PHCC has a psychologist and case manager to provided MHPSS and GBV services. Community Health Workers played a crucial role in community-based activities and raising awareness. Referrals to specialized services were provided as needed.

The intervention increased community resilience by improving health knowledge and practices, particularly in regard to hygiene, infant and young child feeding practices, and health-seeking behavior. Community sensitization and empowerment, particularly for women and young girls, was emphasized through activities and resources such as the distribution of reusable pads and masks.

Provision of inclusive health care services and psychosocial support to conflict affected population in Idlib governorate

Amidst increasing gaps in medical services and deteriorating living conditions, the Project strengthened the resilience of conflict-affected populations in northwest Syria (NWS). Funded by the SDC, the project contributed to 4 DDD/MdM Türkiye facilities in Idlib, providing primary health care, including SRH and MHPSS services to 71,708 unique beneficiaries; the majority of whom were displaced people from other areas of Syria.

In addition to the consultation services, the project also included other activities such as health promotion and awareness raising, distribution of hygiene and maternity kits, and case management services.

The project specifically targeted the most vulnerable individuals in the areas of intervention, e.g. by organizing home-based medical visits to reach out to the most at-risk individuals. This included pregnant women who are particularly at risk of COVID-19 complications and therefore reluctant to attend DDD/MdM Türkiye clinics.

In total, 50% of healthcare staff in these facilities were women, improving both inclusive services to female beneficiaries and contributing to the empowerment of women in general in northwest Syria.

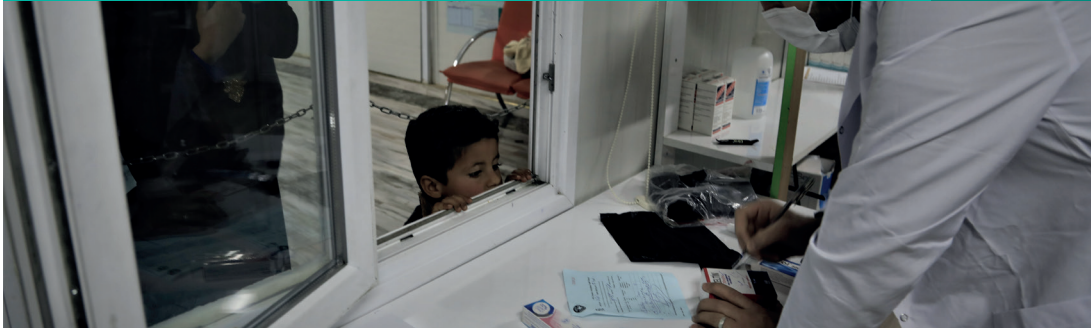

Within the scope of this project, DDD/MdM Türkiye continued providing PHC, SRH and MHPSS services in northwest Syria, i.e. Idlib and Aleppo governorates. Through 14 clinics operated by DDD/MdM Türkiye and the partners, the project directly reached a total of 164.749 individuals who benefitted from multiple services in the clinics in northwest Syria.

DDD/MdM Türkiye services in the region were adapted to COVID-19 context within the scope of the project. The project's response to the pandemic included adaptation of facilities in line with the recommended safety measures, increasing the capacity of the staff in responding to COVID-19, and raising the awareness of target populations about the pandemic. In addition, DDD/MdM Türkiye started to conduct PCR testing at two laboratories in 2020.

The project increased the resilience of the conflict-affected populations in northwest Syria, by enhancing their access to quality health services and protection mainstreaming.

The project strengthened access to lifesaving and life-sustaining essential health services and COVID-19 response in northern Aleppo and northern Idlib. Through targeted health and psychosocial support intervention, it focused on service provision for the most vulnerable groups who have limited access to regular services.

At the end of the project, 95,682 conflict-affected women, children, elderly, and people with disabilities (PwD) benefitted from lifesaving and life-sustaining comprehensive health care services and psychosocial support across three DDD/MdM Türkiye PHCCs: Al Jolan in Dana (Harim District), Jandaris and Jalma in Afrin district. The project ensured the provision of health and MHPSS services in each of the targeted areas, reaching individuals in and out of camps and host community members.

Provision of Primary Health Care (PHC) consultations (outpatient consultations) was provided in two of DDD/MdM Türkiye's PHCCs in Afrin district in Aleppo (Jelmeh and Jandairis) and in one of its Idlib clinics (Al Jolan). PHC included the provision of newborn and inclusive pediatric healthcare to children, and the provision of inclusive healthcare for the elderly, and people with disability (PwD) living with chronic conditions in Al Jolan PHCC. Pregnant women, girls, and victims of S/GBV benefitted from SRH services including ultrasounds, antenatal and postnatal care, labor and delivery care at DDD/MdM Türkiye clinics, Antenatal care, post-natal consultations, and family planning.

Project **Summary**



The project was implemented with the aim of strengthening the provision of health care, particularly the sexual and reproductive health of women, girls, and their families affected by the conflict in the Northwest of Syria. The project, part of a broader response to humanitarian needs in the region, included the purchase of an ultrasound machine for the DDD/MdM Türkiye clinic in Kelly located in the densely displaced area of Idlib, and the construction of mother and Mother and Child-Friendly Spaces in four DDD/MdM Türkiye clinics.

With funding from the William H. Donner Foundation, DDD/MdM Türkiye improved access to primary health care and sexual and reproductive health services especially for vulnerable women and girls', at four DDD/MdM Türkiye Primary Health Care Clinics in northwestern Syria. A total of 25,331 beneficiaries visited the Kelly clinic in Idlib and 55,527 beneficiaries visited clinics in Afrin, Jandairis, and Jalma clinics during the project period.

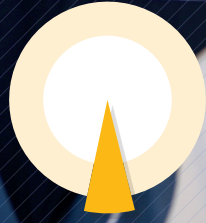

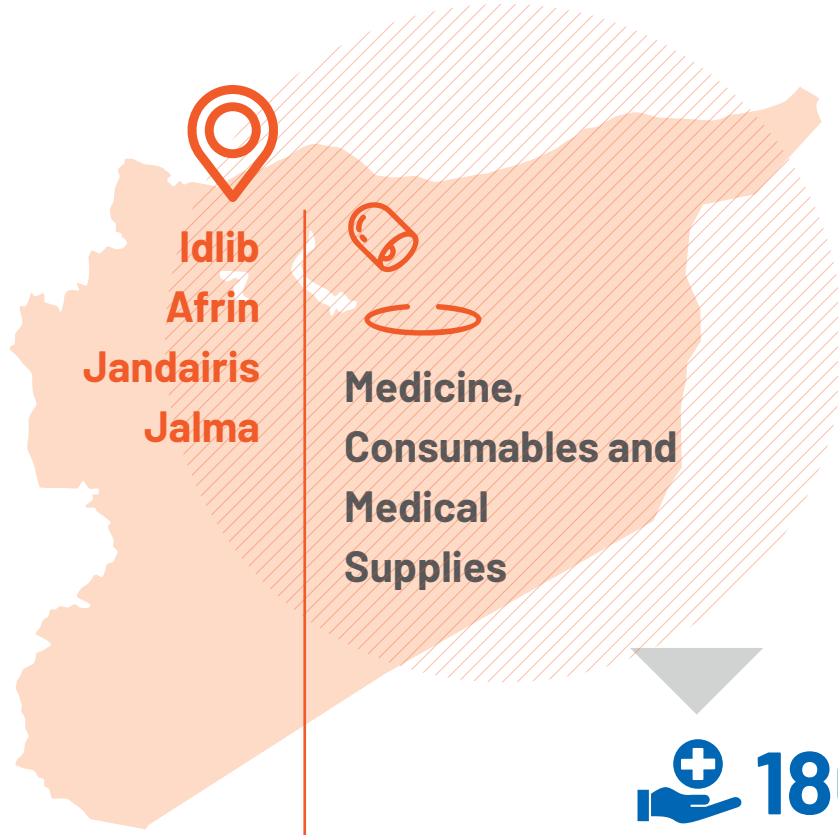

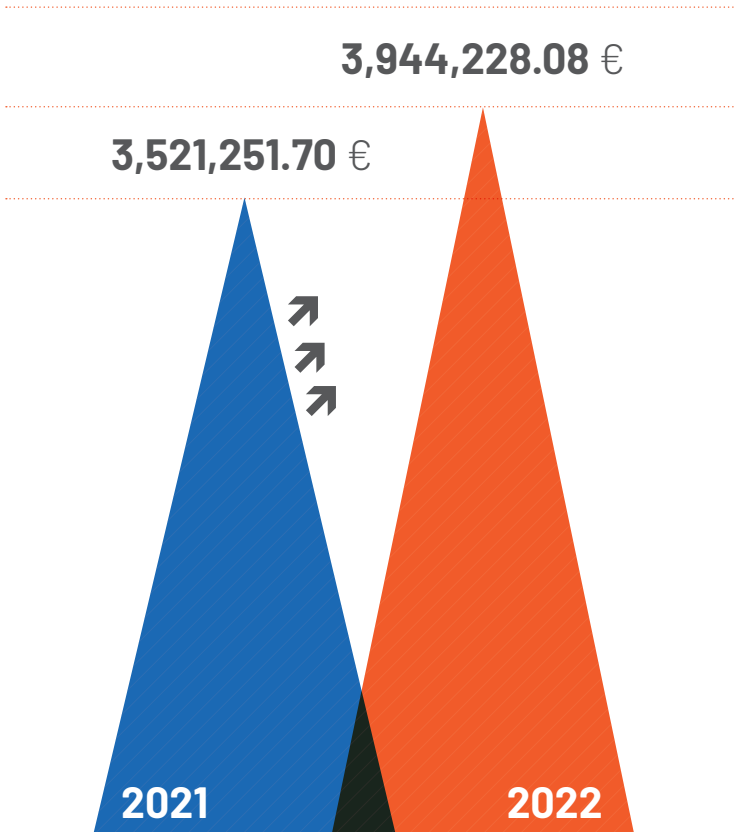

JOINT STATEMENT IN THE SCOPE OF BRUSSELS VI DONORS CONFERENCE ON SYRIA

In the scope of the Brussels VI Donors Conference on Syria, DDD/MdM Türkiye released a joint statement together with Médecins du Monde France and Spain.

In the statement that was published in the name of the Médecins du Monde (MdM) Network, MdM chapters called on the international community and donors to take urgent action for 12 million people without access to healthcare in Syria underlining the increase of humanitarian needs while the funding gap remain important.

JOINT STATEMENT ON UNSC CROSS BORDER RESOLUTION

On July 10 2022, the United Nation Security Council was set to vote on whether to renew the cross-border mechanism, which has allowed the Bab al-Hawa passage to operate since 2014.

As it is the only crossing providing a link between Idlib, northwestern Syria and Türkiye allowing the delivery of humanitarian aid to the region,

DDD/MdM Türkiye, together with MdM France and Spain, released a short statement to call on the United Nations Security Council to renew the provisions of the cross-border resolution on July 10 for at least 12 months to ensure humanitarian aid to the Syrian population.

STATEMENT FOR THE 77TH SESSION OF THE UNITED NATIONS GENERAL ASSEMBLY (UNGA)

From September 13 until September 27, 2022, leaders from around the world gathered in New York for the 77th UN General Assembly to discuss common solutions to current issues such as security and health crises, climatic disasters, and food insecurity that concern our world and our future.

DDD/MdM Türkiye took this opportunity to highlight the urgent needs and urge global cooperation for humanitarian action through a statement. In the statement DDD/MdM Türkiye calls for the maintenance of international peace and security, more funding in Syria and the renewal of the cross border and to seek sustainable solution to the climate change that affects our future and health.

Little Syrian child hears his mother's voice with "bionic ears" for the first time:

The Story of Aslan

Salahaldin, a Syrian national who fled the war in his country, took refuge in Türkiye via southeastern province of Kilis in 2014 and his wife Hanadi in 2018. Hanadi, who settled in İzmir and obtained "Temporary Protection Identification Documents" with her husband, gave birth to a child, named Aslan, three years ago.

According to newborn hearing screening test, doctors found that Aslan could not hear. Upon the family's application, a hearing aid was provided to Aslan Alomar by an association. However, the device was not effective.

Doctors told the family that a cochlear implant (bionic ear) must be surgically implanted to the little Aslan, which allows the hearing to occur electronically, bypassing the ear phase, and transmitting the message directly to the acoustic (cochlear) nerve.

Aslan's 37-year-old father, Salahaldin, who works in a market, applied to Dünya Doktorları Derneği (DDD) / Médecins du Monde (MdM)



Türkiye for the treatment of his child, who has aggressive attitudes due to hearing loss and constantly cry. DDD/MdM Türkiye took action so that Aslan could hear, and learned that he needs to have an operation before the age of 5 in order to have a high chance of success.

With the support of U.S. Department of State: Bureau of Population, Refugees,



and Migration, DDD/MdM Türkiye provided Aslan with the necessary cochlear implant device, and a team of doctors, including Dr. Ibrahim Cukurova, Assoc. Prof. Dr. Gül Caner Mercan, and Assoc. Prof. Dr. İlker Burak Arslan, performed Aslan's inner ear surgery in September to place the implant.

One month after the surgery, doctors installed the device behind the ear at Adolescent Counseling and Health Service Center (ÇİDEM).

3-year-old Syrian boy Aslan excitedly hugged his mother because that was the first voice for the first time: his mother's voice.

"We are very happy to see that our child is able to hear now. We hope Aslan will also speak after special practices. My wife wants to hear the word, "mother", from our

child. And I am waiting to hear the word, "father", from him as well," Aslan's father Salahaldin said.

Aslan can now hear his parents and the colors of world's sounds.

Aslan's parents dream the day that their son could start speaking with the special education to given for his improvement of speaking skills. Aslan will be able to close the communication gap with his peers until school age.



The Story of Congolese
Bondeko:

A Reason to Hope

Veronica, a 32-year-old woman from the Democratic Republic of Congo, was born in Kinshasha. Her father, unfortunately, had two wives and they were all living together once upon a time, including Veronica and her brothers and sisters. After a while, her birth mother could not take this situation no longer and left the house. Following the mother's leave, Veronica also decided to escape from home and began to live with her aunt upon the stepmother started to abuse and misbehave her.

"I had to work to earn money while I was studying at high school. However, both working and studying at the same time was impossible, so I had to dropout and started working as a tailor," Veronica says.

Life was getting harder and harder for the young Veronica in DR Congo. After her aunt's husband attempted to commit psychological and sexual violence against Veronica, she decided to leave the house once again.

"I managed to cross to Angola with the money I saved by working when I was 21. I walked four days with almost no food and water to do this. I noticed

for the first time how a human being can resist all the challenges to achieve a new life even under terrible conditions," Veronica continues.

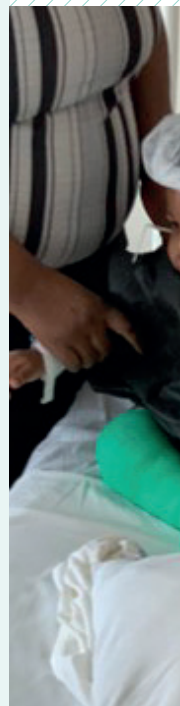
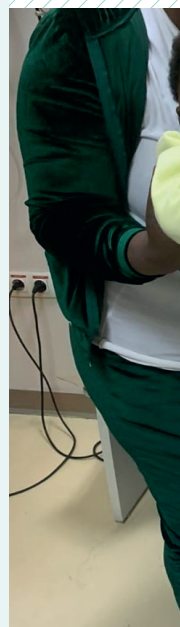
Maintaining her life by working as a tailor, Veronica lived in Angola for eight years alone. However, after the then-Angola President's strict legal practices and pressures on foreign nationals living in the country, promoting ethnic tensions, Veronica had to leave Angola and migrated to Türkiye in 2020.

"When I arrived in Türkiye, I was alone and lonely. There was no one I know in this huge city I moved," she tells.

Veronica, after a while, conceived a child out of wedlock by a Congolese man who she met in Türkiye.

"I had noticed so late that I was pregnant. And her father had already returned to Congo when Bondeko, my baby, was born," says Veronica, the Congolese asylum seeker currently living in Türkiye with her six friends.

Although she works as a hairstyler in Izmir, the money Veronica earns can only afford to meet her basic needs and she was so worried about her son, Bondeko's future as an African refugee in Türkiye. Since Veronica does not have an international protection identity, she and her son cannot access to health care services in the country. Yet, her son, Bondeko, had a con-



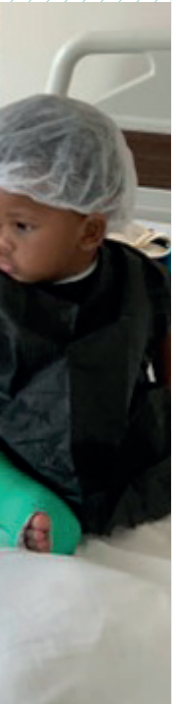


genital medical problem and needed to be treatment for a brighter future.

Under these circumstances, Veronica and Bondeko met with Dünya Doktorları Derneği (DDD) / Médecins du Monde (MdM) TürkiyeTürkiye through the referral of a local NGO.

Bondeko had a metatarsus adductus, which is a congenital condition that causes the front part of the toes and feet to curve inward. His illness is the most common foot deformity that healthcare providers see in babies. About 1 in 1,000 babies are born with this birth defect, while some studies say it's more common than that, and up to 12% of babies are born with it.

Bondeko was suffering from a serious difficulty in walking properly due to his pyshical disability and could not access to health services as one of the most fundamental human rights. In company with DDD/MdM Türkiye's protection officers and French translators, Bondeko received the necessary medical examination at a pediatric clinic of the contracted hospital. Bondeko's pediatrician informed that his development was quite well and that he might feel uncomfortable because he was growing new teeth. After his preliminary medical examination at pediatry, Bondeko was referred to the orthopedy outpatient department for the curve in his foot. The orthopedist stated that this curve on Bondeko's



foot could not be healed with a plaster cast, and he had to undergo medical operation.

Approximately one month later, doctors from the private hospital in collaboration with DDD/MdM Türkiye successfully performed Bondeko's surgery which would be the first significant step towards his ability to walk and run healthfully.

After being discharged from the hospital, DDD/MdM Türkiye staff accompanied with Bondeko and her mother, providing the necessary medication in the prescription written by the doctors. As Bondeko's medical situation is getting much better each passing day, DDD/MdM Türkiye's protection officers and case workers still continue to follow-up him for the second phase of the treatment - which is pyshical therapy and rehabilitation.

DDD/MdM Türkiye informed Veronica of the access to health services in Türkiye and the emergency call center, providing additional psychosocial support due to traumatic experiences she has faced so far.

Bondeko, little Congolese baby, is now able to walk and play cheerfully as his peers do. His mother, Veronica, who has been struggling with bitter experiences of forced migration, violence and poverty alone, looks much more hopefully to the future with his one and only son.



The Story of Nadim:

Little Steps to Wards a Brighter Future

Nadim is a 6-year-old Syrian child whose family migrated to Türkiye from Syria nine years ago amidst the war lasting since 2011 under heavy economic conditions.

Nadim's father, Wadat, and his mother, Aisha, have actually a bond of kinship, but married in Türkiye in 2015. The family lives in an old house in Türkiye's Izmir with a total of eight people from their relatives who fled Syria to Türkiye together.

Nadim is one of their two children from this consanguineous marriage, and he has congenital pyshical disabilities. Before Dünya Doktorları Derneği (DDD) / Médecins du Monde (Mdm) Türkiye's intervention, doctors from the Behçet Uz Pediatric Diseases and Surgery Training and Research Hospital in Izmir examined him, diagnosing that Nadim suffers from valgus on his bilateral ankle and is not able stand without a supportive medical equipment.

Although he has temporary protection ID, Nadim's family cannot afford to buy ortho-



pedic boots and walker since the father, Wadat, works as a tailor with a monthly salary of 2800 Turkish Lira (\$160) – which is even far below the current minimum wage in Türkiye. Moreover, Nadim, due to the family's poor economic situation and his disability, cannot go to the school.

"One of my dreams is to see my sons with a bright future. I know it could only be possible with education, but our economic situation and my son's disability do not allow us to prepare him for a bright future," Aisha, Nadim's mother, tells in sorrow.

During the field visit carried out by DDD/Mdm Türkiye in Izmir's Konak, the case work-



ers and translators reached Aisha and interviewed her, identifying their needs. As a result of the interview, DDD/MdM Türkiye decided that the family needs special education for Nadim's continuity to education, awareness and information on social rights and benefits, and providing medical supportive equipment for the child with congenital disability.

Nadim has a medical report for his disability, but the family requires a medical equipment report to get a walker that will enable Nadim to stand alone. Therefore, DDD/MdM Türkiye's Arabic translator got an appointment from the physical rehabilitation unit of the Behçet Uz Pediatric Diseases and Surgery Training and Research Hospital for the family via "Alo 182", the governmental appointment management system affiliated to the Turkish Ministry of Health.

After getting the updated prescription and medical equipment report with the help of DDD/MdM Türkiye's case worker and translator, Nadim with his parents, Wadat and Aisha, was referred to the Turkish Red Crescent to meet his medical needs.

In addition to this, DDD/MdM Türkiye's protection officer contacted with the Guidance

and Research Center (RAM) for Nadim's special education needs. However, the authorities at the center informed that Nadim has not turned 6 years old yet, therefore his parents should apply again on August 2022. DDD/MdM Türkiye is following up Nadim's schooling process, while the parents were also referred to another NGO for financial support due to the family's socioeconomic deprivation.

Nadim, a 6-year-old Syrian child with congenital disability, is now able to stand and walk with his new orthopedic boots and walker. He has accessed to education, and is taking little steps each passing day towards a brighter future with the great support of his family.



At Death's Door:

A life-saving Intervention for Afghan Refugee Father in Türkiye

Hayrullah, a 35-year-old father of four children, was a farmer in Afghanistan. Originally from the northern Afghan city of Faryab, he and his family fled Afghanistan as Taliban advanced throughout the country. He arrived in Türkiye in 2019.

"When it's a matter of life and death for your family, everything changes," says Hayrullah.

"I had an ordinary life in Afghanistan until they [the Taliban] came. I had a house, I had a car, and provided for my family," he continues. "I had to sell my car, my house, everything. I lost everything and decided to flee to Türkiye."

In 2018, doctors in Afghanistan diagnosed a 15-cm tumor on Hayrullah's kidney when he presented to the hospital with complaints of stomachache. Although he started medical treatment for the tumor on the kidney,



Hayrullah could neither afford to continue further the treatment nor find appropriate services to remove it.

Despite his health deteriorating each passing day, with the Taliban's advance in the country Hayrullah decided to escape from Afghanistan to Türkiye.

After a harsh and challenging journey from Afghanistan through Iran to the Turkish border, Hayrullah and his family settled in Istanbul. He began to work at leather manufacturing factory. Hayrullah was undocumented: he had no residence or work permits or social security and worked under exceedingly difficult conditions. As he was de-



prived of basic rights, Hayrullah did not have access to health care services despite his tumor continuing to grow.

Hayrullah met with Dünya Doktorları Derneği (DDD) / Médecins du Monde (MdM) Türkiye after he was referred by the association, Türkistan Elleri. Following his application, DDD/MdM's health counsellor, Farsi translator and case worker, examined Hayrullah. They decided that he should be urgently referred to a hospital where he can have a medical operation to remove the tumor from his kidney.

The cost of Hayrullah's vital operation was \$2,500 (45,000 Turkish Lira), but he could

not afford to pay it. DDD/MdM Türkiye negotiated with a private hospital and paid for Hayrullah's treatment. Dr. Mamun Hatipoğlu took Hayrullah under a long and serious operation which lasted seven hours.

"If Hayrullah could not have had this medical operation, he would have died in a month. The surgery took a long time, about 7-8 hours. It was a difficult operation. We removed a tumor around two and a half kilograms. The tumor had begun to spread to the liver, intestines, and other parts of internal organs. We removed and separated them all one by one with two doctors, myself, and a urologist," says Hatipoğlu. "When we noticed that Hayrullah's life was in danger due to this large-scale tumor, DDD/MdM immediately approved the operation, paying for the expenses for him."

In tears Hayrullah said, "I feared that my four children would be left orphans if I died. Who will look after them? I don't have money; how and where could I find it under these economic conditions? DDD/MdM Türkiye covered my surgery expenses and saved my life."

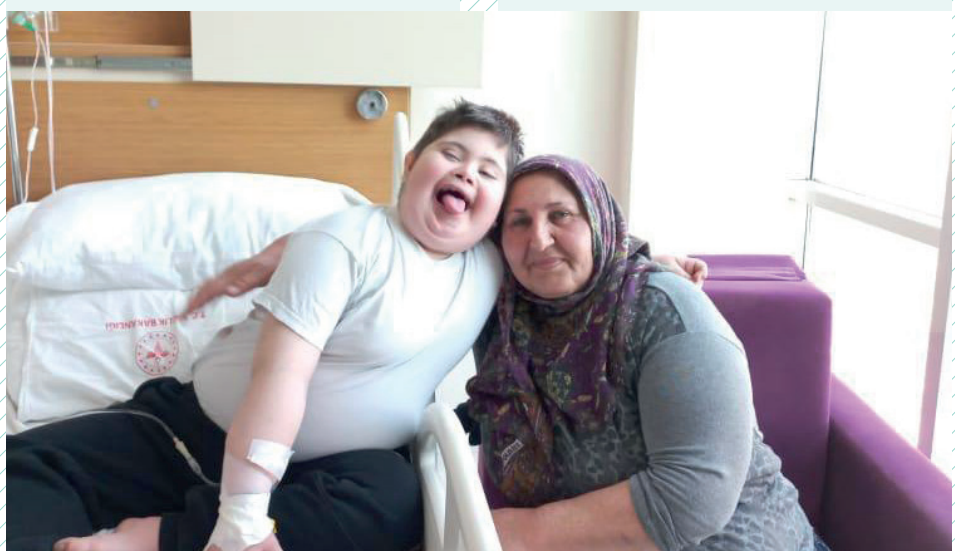
Hayrullah has won this fight for his health. His family's position in Türkiye remains precarious but he now has the energy and hope to work to improve his family's future.



A Little Child with Down Syndrome Finds Hope in War-Torn Syria

Youssef, an 11-year-old Syrian child with Down Syndrome, lives with his parents and three brothers in Afrin's Jandairis town located in the war-torn North West Syria's Aleppo Governorate. His father, who works as a turner in the region, is the only member of the family bringing home the bread under harsh living conditions in the country.

Youssef started to suffer from diaphragmatic hernia after open-heart surgery. Although his parents admitted





several health institutions, they could not relieve their son's pain. Youssef also has a series of problems related to the gland, leading him to difficulties in sleeping at nights and moving due to his overweight.

"We took Youssef to many doctors because of his shortness of breath and poor oxygen. He has suffered a lot and has been living in this condition for several years," his mother tells.

Finally, Youssef's parents visited Dünya Doktorları (DDD)/Médecins du Monde (MdM) Türkiye's health center in Jandairis for their son's treatment.

After DDD/MdM Türkiye's pediatrician preliminary examination, Youssef was referred to the secondary health care

services via the National (Military) Hospital.

With the help of DDD/MdM Türkiye's field manager, Youssef and his parents crossed the Syrian border to Türkiye's southern province of Hatay for a better medical treatment and surgery in coordination of DDD/MdM Türkiye and Turkish Ministry of Health.

"DDD/MdM Türkiye helped us a lot and greatly cared of my son. I wish everyone a healthy life," Youssef's mother concludes.

Youssef, a 11-year-old Syrian child with Down Syndrome, is now much healthier, can sleep deeply at nights, got rid of his pain and extra weights. The little child has found hope amidst the war despite his untreatable disease.

DDD/MdM Türkiye continues to regularly follow up Youssef and will start special sessions within its mental health and psychosocial support unit soon.



A Story of Ukrainian Mother and Daughter

Fleeing the War to Türkiye

Maryia and her child, Elena, were living in Vinnitsya in west-central Ukraine until the war has totally changed their life.

Elena, who witnessed all brutality of the war in her homeland, started to have trauma related crying spells and behavioral problems.

After the bombs hit Vinnitsya, Maryia and Elena had to flee their country and migrate to Türkiye in March 2022. However, Elena's temper tantrum and self-harm behaviors began to increase due to the war and sudden migration to a foreign country with almost completely different cultural dynamics.

Due to Elena's behavioral problems, Maryia applied to DDD/MdM Türkiye office in Izmir. After the first interview, Dünya Doktorları Derneği (DDD)/Médecins du Monde (MdM) Türkiye's psychologists and case workers paid a home visit to Manisa, where Maryia and Elena are currently living. They firstly



observed that the psychological state of the child, and then gave psychoeducation to her mother, applying psychological first aid for Maryia's bad experience during the war in Ukraine. Maryia's mental state was depressive at the beginning, while both had intense emotions of longing and desperation due to the anxiety of uncertainty.

DDD/MdM Türkiye psychologists held a therapy session with her on the basis that Maryia's psychological strength is the priority for the well-being of her child, Elena. Their treatment is being followed up for the next therapy process by DDD/MdM Türkiye psychologists and case workers as Maryia and Elena's mental states showed a considerable improvement in the process of psychological treatment.
